

The Lessons

A Reading from Genesis

Genesis 1:1-2:4a

In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth, the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep, while a wind from God swept over the face of the waters. Then God said, "Let there be light"; and there was light. And God saw that the light was good; and God separated the light from the darkness. God called the light Day, and the darkness he called Night. And there was evening and there was morning, the first day.

And God said, "Let there be a dome in the midst of the waters, and let it separate the waters from the waters." So God made the dome and separated the waters that were under the dome from the waters that were above the dome. And it was so. God called the dome Sky. And there was evening and there was morning, the second day.

And God said, "Let the waters under the sky be gathered together into one place, and let the dry land appear." And it was so. God called the dry land Earth, and the waters that were gathered together he called Seas. And God saw that it was good. Then God said, "Let the earth put forth vegetation: plants yielding seed, and fruit trees of every kind on earth that bear fruit with the seed in it." And it was so. The earth brought forth vegetation: plants yielding seed of every kind, and trees of every kind bearing fruit with the seed in it. And God saw that it was good. And there was evening and there was morning, the third day.

And God said, "Let there be lights in the dome of the sky to separate the day from the night; and let them be for signs and for seasons and for days and years, and let them be lights in the dome of the sky to give light upon the earth." And it was so. God made the two great lights—the greater light to rule the day and the lesser light to rule the night—and the stars. God set them in the dome of the sky to give light upon the earth, to rule over the day and over the night, and to separate the light from the darkness. And God saw that it was good. And there was evening and there was morning, the fourth day.

And God said, "Let the waters bring forth swarms of living creatures, and let birds fly above the earth across the dome of the sky." So God created the great sea monsters and every living creature that moves, of every kind, with which the waters swarm, and every winged bird of every kind. And God saw that it was good. God blessed them, saying, "Be fruitful and multiply and fill the waters in the seas, and let birds multiply on the earth." And there was evening and there was morning, the fifth day.

And God said, "Let the earth bring forth living creatures of every kind: cattle and creeping things and wild animals of the earth of every kind." And it was so. God made the wild animals of the earth of every kind, and the cattle of every kind, and everything that creeps upon the ground of every kind. And God saw that it was good.

Then God said, "Let us make humankind in our image, according to our likeness; and let them have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the birds of the air, and over the cattle, and over all the wild animals of the earth, and over every creeping thing that creeps upon the earth."

So God created humankind in his image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them.

God blessed them, and God said to them, "Be fruitful and multiply, and fill the earth and subdue it; and have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the air and over every living thing that moves upon the earth." God said, "See, I have given you every plant yielding seed that is upon the face of all the earth, and every tree with seed in its fruit; you shall have them for food. And to every beast of the earth, and to every bird of the air, and to everything that creeps on the earth, everything that has the breath of life, I have given every green plant for food." And it was so. God saw everything that he had made, and indeed, it was very good. And there was evening and there was morning, the sixth day.

Thus the heavens and the earth were finished, and all their multitude. And on the seventh day God finished the work that he had done, and he rested on the seventh day from all the work that he had done. So God blessed the seventh day and hallowed it, because on it God rested from all the work that he had done in creation.

These are the generations of the heavens and the earth when they were created.







The Breaking of the Bread





Today's Music

Preachers tend to dread Trinity Sunday because of its tendency to get bogged down in theological dogma. However, choirs like it because they get to sing "Holy, holy," a perennial favorite hymn, and the wonderful, though lengthy, "I bind unto myself today the strong name of the Trinity," lovingly referred to by its tune name, *St. Patrick's Breastplate*, with words attributed to Saint Patrick. Our anthem, by American Organist/Choirmaster and Composer, Michael Bedford (b. 1949), is a setting of a text by the composer with three unison verses in praise of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, respectively, followed by a closing section wherein the same verses are heard in canon.

Starting next week, the choir is off for three months as Music Director Murray Walker enjoys an extended holiday granted by the Vestry in recognition of his 27 years' service to Calvary and his extra responsibilities during this interim period.

From our Music Director

Dear Calvary Family:

In recognition of my 27 years of service to Calvary and the extra responsibility that has landed on my shoulders during COVID and our present interim period, the Vestry has graciously granted me a "sabbatical." That is in quotation marks because this is not a sabbatical, *per se*, which usually involves some formal enrichment or professional development activities. While I will, no doubt, listen to a lot of church music during this time, it really means two extra months paid holiday this summer, over and above the one month I normally take. The choir's and my last Sunday will be Trinity Sunday, 4 June. We will be back on duty on 17 September.

During our absence our organist, Kate Saphir, will be on hand to play hymns, service music, and her regular preludes and postludes. To facilitate congregational singing, I have compiled a list of our well-known hymns for the Worship Committee to choose from each week.

During my time off I plan to make my regular summer trip to British Columbia to visit my grandchildren and other family members who live in the Vancouver area and, no doubt, stay a little longer than usual. As I did last summer, I will trail my little boat up there behind my Honda CRV and explore a bit more of the B.C. coast. For the first time I will be able to attend the Wooden Boat Festival in Port Townsend, Washington which happens the second weekend of September. I also intend to put concentrated effort into the publication of the research I have been occupied with for the last two and a half years, about a mid-twentieth century ballerina with ties to the British Columbia coast. And, of course, there are a few projects around the house that keep calling for my attention.

I am very grateful to Calvary's Vestry for giving me this gift of time. I plan to come back refreshed and recharged to serve Calvary's music ministry.

Interested in some summer reading? Members of the Adult Education committee would like to invite you to join an informal discussion group of John Caputo's What Would Jesus Deconstruct: The Good News of Post-modernism for the Church. We will meet via Zoom on Wednesdays at 6:00, beginning June 21st. There are 6 chapters in the book, so we will probably meet for six weeks, but the group may decide differently. Caputo introduces the notion of why the church needs deconstruction, positively defines deconstruction's role in renewal, deconstructs idols of the church, and imagines the future of the church in addressing the practical implications of this for the church's life through liturgy, worship, preaching, and teaching. Students of philosophy, theology, religion, and ministry, as well as others interested in engaging postmodernism and the emerging church phenomenon, will welcome this provocative, non-technical work.
